#### PEACCE AT LUNCH: PEACEBUILDING AT THE LUNCH TABLE

As the world commemorated this year's International Day of Peace on 21st September, we supported five (5) recent fellows of the ASFIT Young Peacebuilders Fellowship Programme from five (5) communities to help them implement the maiden edition of the 'Peace at Lunch' initiative with their friends and family in their respective communities.

'Peace at Lunch' sought to encourage people to take an interest in peace and security issues in the country, particularly in their local communities. Therefore, while they gathered with their friends and family to enjoy lunch, we encouraged them to talk about personal and community peace.

Unemployment, lack of stakeholder engagement fora, and low public sensitization on peace and security were identified by participants as key areas to be addressed by stakeholders in order to promote peace and security in Ghana.

The maiden edition was a great success and hope to replicate it in other communities as well.



## ADDRESSING FOOTBALL-RELATED VIOLENCE: FOOTBALL SHOULD UNITE US, NOT DIVIDE US - ASFIT'S EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The Executive Director of African Students For Interfaith Tolerance, a youth-led peacebuilding non-governmental organization (NGO) based in the North East Region of Ghana has called on all Ghanaians especially football supporters, football clubs, and football administrators to leverage the potential of football as a unifying and a peacebuilding tool.

He made this call at the climax of Suhudua Deema (Peace Games) organized in Walewale by his organization for football clubs in the West Mamprusi Municipal.

The final football match was very competitive and was between Bokuduri FC and Wungu Daribio until it was finally settled at the penalties in the favour of Wungu Daribio.



Touching on the successful end of the football games, Mr. Issah Toha Shamsoo, the Executive Director of the organization said;

"I am glad to see the successful climax of the peace games. These games were organized as part of a broader project we are implementing known as sports4peace and so even before the games, we held a one-day capacity building workshop for the participating football clubs and the West Mamprusi Municipal Football Association on how they can identify early warning signs and also for the peaceful resolution of grievances. In addition to that, we visited all the participating teams at their training centers to engage with the players and some of their supporters."



"The sports4peace initiative in simple terms recognizes the power of football to unite us as a people for peace. Thus, in so doing, we strive to address violence and hooliganism associated with football so that people can enjoy the game without the fear of violence. I would also like to thank our partner, Euphrates Institute, for their support." He said.

The stakeholders who were present commended the organization for their peacebuilding efforts and admonished the football teams and their supporters to be peace ambassadors.

The climax event brought together key stakeholders including religious and traditional leaders, youth groups, football clubs, the West Municipal Football Association, and Civil Society Organizations such as the North East Regional Secretariat of the United Nations Association Ghana, Northern Innovation Lab, Brave Aurora, and many others.





## YOUTH EMPOWERMENT: GRADUATES TRAINED ON CV WRITING TECHNIQUES AND USING DIGITAL TOOLS TO SECURE JOB OPPORTUNITIES

Unemployment remains one of the biggest challenges confronting young people in Ghana. According to data available on statista.com, in 2020, the unemployment rate in Ghana was at approximately 4.53 percent of the total labour force, and limited access to the right training on how to find and secure job opportunities using both online and offline tools and techniques makes this challenge a lot more difficult to overcome.

Therefore, on Saturday, 25th June, 2022, African Students For Interfaith Tolerance in partnership with Northern Innovation Lab and with the support and participation of Captain Jamaldeen Tonzua Seidu successfully held a one-day training workshop for graduates, NSS Personnel, and students of tertiary institutions in Walewale, North East Region.

The training workshop focused on building the capacity of participants in writing standard and appropriate curricula vitae, preparing for interviews, creating and managing attractive LinkedIn profiles, and an introduction to other digital tools in order to enhance their chances of securing jobs.








# AFRICAN STUDENTS FOR INTERFAITH TOLERANCE ENGAGES YOUNG GIRLS ON SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH

The prevailing economic conditions in Ghana and in addition to the obnoxious and burdensome import tax of 20% and a value-added tax of 12.5% on disposable sanitary pads and products have resulted in their prices skyrocketing hence making access to these basic necessities in the lives of women and girls hard to access.

This negatively impacts the lives and confidence of girls as some school girls often miss out on school whenever there are in their periods to avoid any 'messy; situation in school.



In partnership with the headmistress of Onwe Methodist JHS Mrs. Afua Akyiaa Gambrah, the Minister in charge of Onwe Methodist church, Revered Philip Osei Antwi, and the entire staff for Onwe Methodist JHS, our Women's Affairs Coordinator, Madam Nathlaine Matilda Marfo engaged students of Onwe Methodist JHS.

Over 120 students participated in this engagement. The girls were taught how to correctly fix their sanitary pads and were also encouraged not to miss out on school when they are on their periods. We also made a donation of sanitary pads to the girls.

The boys on the other hand were engaged in addressing some of the misconceptions they have about mensuration.

#### ADDRESSING FOOTBALL VIOLENCE AND HOOLIGANISM: AFRICAN STUDENTS FOR INTERFAITH TOLERANCE LAUNCHES SPORTS4PEACE INITIATIVE

#### **BACKGROUND**

We are witnessing a rising occurrence of violence and hooliganism in Ghanaian football with many fearing the reoccurrence of the unfortunate Accra stadium disaster which sadly took the lives of 126 people, making it the worst stadium disaster ever taken place in Africa.

Despite football often being described by most people as the nation's passion, it attracts sometimes leads to reprisal attacks.

Thus, Ghanaian football has been significantly tarnished over the years by the almost regular violent activities at the various stadia without proper solutions.

This initiative – Sports4Peace thus recognizes the power of football to unite people around a common goal and at the same time has the potential to be exploited by people to foment trouble and undermine our peace and security.

#### **OUTCOMES**

- Clubs management demonstrates a greater understanding of the effects of violence in football and how to prevent them.

One of the key outcomes of today's event is the signing of a peace pledge by religious leaders and other members of our community."

Ghana is widely hailed as one of Africa's model democracies and the second most peaceful country in Africa according to the latest ranking by the Global Peace Index.

The march was also an opportunity to draw the attention of stakeholders to the need to support local peacebuilding efforts.
